My Lord

We have the honor to inform
 your Lordship, that on the 25th Feb^r
 the Cholera Morbus appeared in the
 suburbs of this city, and that since that
 period it has raged here with extraordinary
 malignity, carrying off vast numbers
 of the inhabitants, particularly the people
 of colour. On the first appearance of
 the disease, nearly half the population
 fled from the Havana, and most of the
 landed Proprietors proceeded to their estates
 in the country, where we are sorry to
 say they prevail at present excessive
 mortality, although the Havana is getting
 every day more healthy.

Among others who have retired
 to their estates are the two Spaniards

When therefore a Spanish Slave vessel was brought into this harbour, by His Majesty's Schooner Nimble, on the 10th, the Captain General immediately addressed the note to us, a translation of which we have now the honour to enclose, appointing Colonel Don Rafael Lucena former Commissary of Arbitration to be Commissary Judge ad interim and Colonel Don Juan Garcia y Minoz to be Commissary of Arbitration ad interim. These Gentlemen took the necessary oaths on the morning of the 12th Inst.
